Dear parents, carers and students.

I can't remember an earlier Easter than the one we had right at the start of the Easter break. We saw trees begin to grow new leaves that week. Now we are back the trees are full of life and growing again. The summer term is always a very exciting one in schools. We prepare to welcome new students into Year 7 and 12. Our students in Year 11 and 13 can demonstrate what they have learned in their GCSE and A-level exams. Students in every year group are preparing to move upwards towards ever increasing independence. The month of April marks a global awareness event known as Earth Day. This annual event, now in its 54th year, will be celebrated on 22 April 2024. The focus this year is a commitment to ending plastics for the sake of human and planetary health. Reducing our plastic footprint is crucial for both environment and human health reasons. Microplastics, being so pervasive in our environment, post significant risks to ecosystems and human health alike. I was surprised to find out how much damage microplastics do. I was even more surprised to find them in products like facial washes! The 'Planet vs Plastic' movement is demanding a 60% reduction in the production of ALL plastics by 2024. Individuals can take practical steps to reduce their plastic footprint by following simple steps like those below:

- 1. Use reusable containers and water bottles
- 2. Choose plastic-free packaging
- 3. Avoid disposable plastics
- 4. Support plastic-free initiatives by choosing brands that prioritise sustainable packaging and practices
- 5. Dispose properly of plastic waste by recycling whenever possible to prevent them from entering waterways and ecosystems
- 6. Participate in clean-up effort such as those on beaches, parks and water bodies
- 7. Spread awareness by educating others


In English, 8P & 8H have started reading Lord of the Flies and have been having some really interesting conversations about what attributes create a good leader. They have all engaged really well.


This week our behaviour focus has been on mobile phones. We accept that students may need their phones to and from school, however, in school they are a source of distraction and at worse used to bully other students. All this takes away from the primary purpose of school, which is learning in a safe environment. As a reminder, if staff see students with a phone, they will be asked to put it away, if they refuse or have to be asked on a second occasion, the member of staff will ask for the phone to be put in the school safe until the end of the day. Refusal to hand over their phone will incur a 30 min detention and an incident will be logged. If 3 incidents are logged then students may be issued with a ban. This will mean either leaving their phone at home or handing their phone in at the start of the day to be collected after school.
