## Keeping Your Child Safe While Enjoying Time in the Community – Norfolk Community Safety Partnership

Having fun and hanging out with friends is an important part of growing up. We want all children and young people in Norfolk to feel safe and confident about spending time in the community without parental/adult supervision when the time is right for them.

As parents and carers, it can feel challenging to give them independence while ensuring their wellbeing. Here are some helpful tips to consider:

- Know the basics: Do you know where your child is spending time and with who? Encourage them to stick together and look out for each other in a place they feel safe.
- Spot the signs: Talk about recognising red flags in other people's behaviour and what to do if something feels wrong. You can find out more on our dedicated website: <a href="Home | Know the Signs">Home | Know the Signs</a> (https://knowthesigns.info/)
- Plan for support: Make sure they know how to seek help for themselves or a friend if needed. It is also important for you as a parent or carer to ensure that your child has safe transport to and from places, and if this is by public transport to make sure, they have enough money for their return trip.
- Stay connected: Is their mobile phone charged to ensure they could contact you if they needed any help? Consider using a location-sharing app like Life360 or check your phone provider's safety features.





 Open conversations: Regularly talk about online and offline risks, including grooming and exploitation, and reassure them they can come to you without fear of getting into trouble.

A little preparation goes a long way in helping your child enjoy their independence while staying safe. As a parent or carer, it is important for you to talk to your children about all potential risks that could be posed to them when out in the community, to ensure they are able to make informed choices around their own and their peers' safety.

We're celebrating Young Poet's Week in the library!

The National Literacy Trust have launched a brand-new competition to find their next Young Poet Laureate, and students aged up to 14 are invited to take part. To enter, students simply need to write their own poem and submit it to the library by Monday 19th January 2026.

Next year, 12 young poets will be selected as regional Young Poet Laureates. These students will receive mentoring from professional poets and gain opportunities to write for commission and perform at events, joining the national Poet Laureate, Simon Armitage, in championing the power of poetry in public life.





To mark Young Poet's Week, we welcomed the wonderful local poet Lewis Buxton, who delivered an engaging, interactive talk to the whole of Year 7 on Tuesday. We're also running special poetry lessons in the library throughout the week, where students are exploring poems about themselves, their backgrounds, their families, and their heritage, hopefully leaving some feeling inspired and confident enough to submit their work to the competition.


#### **Midwinter Tales**
