



Open Academy Update 15 January 2021 For parents and students – please do discuss the contents with your child!

Dear Parent/Carer

Welcome to the newsletter this week.

I will start with a heartfelt thank you to all those of you who have taken the time to email in your feedback, praise and thanks for the work of the staff in trying to provide virtual schooling. It is so encouraging for us when you take the time. It really makes a difference so Thank You!

We desperately miss the students in person but we can see an end to the world revolving around the virus, so in the meantime, we are keen to do all we can to keep students learning.

Our systems indicate far better engagement with lessons and work than during the previous school lockdown. Many sessions at Key Stage 4 are seeing 80 or 90% attendance with Key Stage 3 not far behind, partly because I think students know that they will just have more to catch up if they leave it, but partly because we are hopefully providing a more consistent service.

Where some of you are struggling with technoloy and your children are working on paper, please make sure you highlight difficulties to the Assistant Heads of Year when they do their regular pastoral check phone calls and we will see what we can do – at the very least we can arrange to get work checked and returned.

Last week, I noted that there was so much to share it is overwhelming to try to cover everything so I thought it best to take a key issue at a time and share what we know. In that spirit this week, I will start with testing...

COVID-19 TESTING - LFD Testing at Open

We have set up a COVID-19 Lateral Flow Device (LFD) assisted testing centre in the Academy Gym as requested by the government. I will explain how the tests are to be completed and then highlight some thoughts and issues.

The idea was that there would be three phases to their introduction:

- 1. Mass testing on return. A staggered return to the Academy would see all students tested twice 3-5 days apart. The second test would be their restart day for full time education. Students would come in on the invited day for an allocated time slot for the test and either return home immediately (test 1), or carry on into school assuming they tested negative (test 2)
- 2. Weekly testing of teachers. After the teachers have their initial 2 tests 3/5 days apart, they would be able to re-start teaching. They would then be tested weekly.
- 3. Close contact testing. Once everyone is back as before Christmas, if we hear of a confirmed case instead of as before we round up potential close contacts and send them home for 10 days, the idea is that we test all the close contacts with the LFD tests every morning for 7 days.

In practice...

The reality is that the national lockdown has at least temporarily halted 1 above. 2 above is underway as teachers are coming in on a rota basis to manage the critical worker and vulnerable student childcare, and 3 above appears to be controversial as to whether it is a safe enough approach and is the cause of much national debate.

Here, we are happy to fully engage as directed with the first 2 actions and we are indeed busily getting on with it. As far as the third strand, we will wait and see what advice and guidance comes out when a plan is formed to bring us back to in-person schooling, and we will risk assess the approach to mass testing again at that time.





Please be reassured that we will continue to do all we can to keep your child and our community safe.

So, what now?

If your child is in for critical worker childcare, chances are they have already had at least one of their 2 coming back tests as per 1 above. However, even though all results so far are negative, as per current advice, they will continue to socially distance, wear masks and sanitise on entry to any room.

So, nothing further to be done at the moment unless your child is in the Academy – if they are, please do read and sign the consent form so that we can test them as they return as it is another helpful step we can take to keep us virus free.

In itself, this kind of testing with its inaccuracies, is hard to see how it might help. However, along with all the other small steps we take, they all add up to a large effort to keep us safe. We are happy to do it as our approach throughout this whole pandemic has been to do everything we can to keep people safe. I hope that makes sense, despite all the confusion in the media.

Finally

Please do keep encouraging your child to stay in the learning habit. Many are doing fabulous work and really trying – it is well worth it!.

Monday morning will see an assembly from Miss Wenlock who will be clarifying our expectations in terms of learning and lessons, and offering lots of helpful advice and guidance. Until then – enjoy the snow if it arrives tomorrow, have the best weekend you can and I will be in touch next week where I will try to shed light on another current concern.

Now, enjoy our newsletter – either skipping to the relevant Year information, or having a look through all the topics. Personally, I'd recommend Mark's reflection as a good starting point as he helps put it all into perspective!


4. Year 8 News
