

This Week's Theme: Christmas and Humility

Humility means having a modest view of yourself — not thinking you are better than others, and being willing to learn, admit mistakes, and show respect.

It's recognising your strengths without boasting and accepting your limitations without shame. Humility often shows up as gentleness, patience, gratitude, and a willingness to serve.

A Story of HUMILITY

Scripture:

Here is **the humble story of Christ's birth.**

The birth of Jesus is one of the greatest examples of humility in the Bible. Though Christians believe He is the Son of God, He did not come into the world with wealth, power, or celebration.

Instead:

Mary and Joseph traveled to Bethlehem, where they found no place to stay.

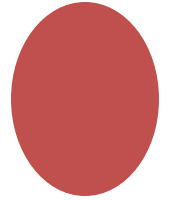
Jesus was born in a stable, a place meant for animals, not kings.

He was **laid in a manger**, a feeding trough, because there was no crib.

The first to hear the news were **shepherds**, ordinary working people considered low in society.

They came with joy and awe, not riches or status, showing that God's love is open to everyone.

This humble beginning reminds believers that greatness is not about status or comfort, but about love and a willing heart. Christ's birth teaches that God often works through the simple, the quiet, and the lowly to bring light into the world.

Service & Compassion


- Am I willing to help with tasks that offer no praise or visibility?

Personal Attitude


- In what areas of my life do I struggle most with pride or needing to be right?

Why this story shows humility

She put the needs of another before her own comfort. She treated someone considered “unimportant” with deep dignity. She acted quietly, without seeking recognition or reward. She lived the belief that every person—rich or poor—is equal and worthy of love.



A Story of HUMILITY:

Mother Teresa: A Story of Humility

One day in Calcutta, Mother Teresa was walking through the streets when she saw a man lying on the road, extremely ill and covered in sores. People were passing by, avoiding him because of his appearance and smell.

Mother Teresa knelt beside him without hesitation. She cleaned his wounds, spoke gently to him, and carried him to the Home for the Dying. As she cared for him, the man looked at her with tears in his eyes and asked, *“Why are you doing this?”*

She smiled and said softly,
“Because you are precious to God. Every person is worth loving.”

The man, who had been ignored and rejected by many, died peacefully later that night. Mother Teresa had restored his dignity in his final hours. She did not help him to be seen or praised—few people even knew about the moment. She simply served with compassion because she believed humility meant seeing Christ in every person, especially the forgotten.

Scripture Soundbite

Philippians 2v3-4

Don't be selfish; don't try to impress others. Be humble, thinking of others as better than yourselves. Don't look out only for your own interests, but take an interest in others, too.

What This Means for Us

Valuing others sincerely

Humility teaches us to look at others with compassion, seeing their worth, listening to their needs, and treating them with dignity. It helps us build relationships rooted in kindness rather than competition.

Being teachable


A humble heart is open to learning, correction, and growth. We admit when we're wrong and celebrate when others succeed.

Serving without seeking praise

Humility shows up in small acts done quietly—helping, giving, forgiving—when no one is watching and no reward is expected.

Finding strength in gentleness

Humility is not weakness. It takes great courage to be patient, forgiving, and self-controlled. True humility brings peace to our hearts and to those around us.
