1. Virtual school is back - Instructions and suggestions from the Virtual School team

We look forward to welcoming all students back to the virtual school on Monday the 20th April

- We will do our best to deliver as full interesting and accessible curriculum at a distance
 as we can as we know that it is crucial that students do not lose the habits of studying
 over the coming few weeks.
- We have had so much feedback from parents, the majority of it really pleased with the approach we are taking despite the technological challenges we are all facing. We really appreciate it and we are doing our best to respond to your suggestions and thoughts as well as we can.
- On the Thursday before Easter we had a staff training day online where we looked at many new ideas. Here are the key principles that the staff were considering:
 - Work set will match as much as possible our in-school curriculum. That way our students do not fall behind
 - Tasks should be set roughly in line with the timetable. Giving a huge amount of work at once is overwhelming.
 - However we know that not all work will be completed by all pupils. There are times when this will not be possible.
 - Plenty of work should be set so no student has too little to do
 - Longer pieces of work will have checkpoints as you would in school
 - As it takes a lot longer to mark work online.
 - We will use online quizzes and tests and programme the computer to mark short answer questions if possible.

- In Key Stage 3 work should not diverge too far from the knowledge organisers or other printed materials so that pupils who have no computer access are not disadvantaged.
- Teachers will try to monitor what the students are doing. If students working on paper send or hand in work packages each week, we will try to look at the work produced and arrange feedback where we can
- Teachers will aim to have regular contact with students.

We appreciate that it is nearly impossible to try to recreate school at home. We know that the majority of parents are not able to suddenly become their children's teacher as well as manage the household and hold down their jobs at this challenging time. So we are trying to set work that allows the students to be working independently.

For some, we know that the online solution is impossible so below we detail how to access printed work if required.

2. Work packs for those struggling with online learning

Printed materials are being made available from the Academy for the term ahead on **Monday 20**th **April and Tuesday 21**st **April** for those students who are struggling to access work online - we know that the majority are able to engage online, however, if you can't that will not stop you now!

We ask that in order to ensure social distancing rules are reinforced we would like to stagger collection times by surname. *Please make sure students do not congregate on the way to or from the academy*

- Students with surnames from A-G arrive between 10:00 and 10:30 to collect their year specific packs
- Students with surnames H-N arrive between 10:30 and 11:00 to collect their year specific packs
- Students with surnames O-Z arrive between 11:00 and 11:30 to collect their year specific packs

There will be separate tables for each year group outside reception - Key stage 3 students will be able to collect their next knowledge organiser for their year group for the term, some further activities, some stationary and resources - Key stage 4 students will be able to collect a range of printed resources

The intention is that these materials are used by the students over an extended period of time. If they complete batches of work and return them to the academy we will arrange for feedback on each work pack that we receive

- If access to a computer is the only issue holding you back we may be able to help as we have a small number that we can loan - please speak to staff when you collect work packs or email the Head of Year/Assistant Head of Year
- If you cannot get to the Academy to collect the work, please email office@openacademy.org.uk and we will try to get one delivered / sent out

3. Free school meals term time arrangement - hamper collection times

Lunch hampers and where required, Breakfast packs will be available for collection between 10 and 12pm on Monday 20th April. If this presents difficulties please email office@open-academy.org.uk and we will try to help

4. New claimants for Free School Meals

We are aware that the current challenging situation may have meant changes to situations regarding employment and income. For some families, this may mean that an application for your child(ren) to access free school meals (FSM) is now relevant. If you believe this to be the case, FSM can be applied for through the following link:
