Message from the Principal

Welcome to our newsletter this week which I thought I would take the opportunity to share a few reminders regarding our uniform standard along with other information.

On uniform, the first thing I would like to say is a huge **thank you**, we really appreciate the hard work you, our parents and carers, who make sure that the vast majority of our pupils are in full uniform every day without any issue.

Over 98% of students get it right so the first thing to say if your child is telling you that 'such and such' student gets away with wearing...' that is not the case. We challenge all instances of non-uniform in all year groups and will do all we can to maintain our high standards. For many of you it was a key reason for choosing this Academy but for all, in agreeing a place at the Academy, you agreed to support our standards.

As we come to half term then and you might be refreshing items of clothing for uniform, please note it is **black shoes not trainers**, **school trousers or skirt** (not fashion items/leggings etc) and blazer and tie at all times. There has been a small increase in the number of students wearing jewellery so I am including the following reminder from our uniform policy. Jewellery: For health and safety reasons, jewellery is not permitted in the Academy. The exceptions to this rule are small studs in pierced ears – one in each lower lobe, and a watch. 'Stretcher' type ear studs are not allowed. Facial, including tongue, and body piercings are not permitted in any circumstances whether visible or not. To clarify, the only jewellery permitted is: One pair of small studs, one in each lower lobe and a wristwatch.

If a child has an item of jewellery beyond that described, they will be asked to remove it and hand it in until the end of the day. We would ask therefore that you check your child is in correct uniform each day to minimise any potential conflict in school.



As I said at the start, our uniform is something we are proud of and that our students wear with pride, your support in upholding this standard is therefore most appreciated.

One quick final note is to raise your awareness that students are participating in a health and wellbeing survey next week. Please see the attached information letter.

Firstly, its parents' evening on Tuesday, 11 February (4-6pm). All students should have made appointments with their subject teachers. If parents or guardians are unable to attend, it is still expected that the students make an appointment and attend themselves.

Unfortunately, attendance seems to be dropping in OA6. This is a reminder that all students should be in the Academy from tutor time until the end of the day at 3pm. Unless you have arranged it with myself, there should be **no students going off site during private study periods**. If students are off sick they must email both myself and their subject teachers, and ask for any missed work to be emailed to them. Students that miss lessons and do not catch up quickly will most likely fall behind in their A Level subjects. It is therefore good practice to get into the habit of having open and clear communication with their teachers via email so that they are aware of the reasons, if they have to miss a lesson, and are then able to forward any work. Please can all students be aware of our Academy policy for appropriate dress code. Students can wear smart/casual clothing with no rips or offensive slogans, no cropped tops or short skirts/shorts. Careers Information

Apprenticeships

If you have a child considering next steps, they might be considering an apprenticeship. An apprenticeship involves on the job training with study, so your student gains qualifications whilst earning a wage.

Apprenticeship levels:

Intermediate Apprenticeship	Advanced Apprenticeship	Higher and Degree Apprenticeships
Level 2	Level 3	Level 4 – 7
12 – 18 months	18 – 24 months	Usually a minimum of 24 months
Equivalent to 5 GCSEs 4-9	Equivalent to 2 A Levels	Equivalent to an Undergraduate or Masters Degree

In the same way as at school or sixth form, they will study at a different level depending on the qualifications. For example, they can study for a degree apprenticeship without having completed an advanced apprenticeship as long as they meet the entry requirements set by the apprenticeship. This would most likely include having level 3 qualifications/equivalent.

If you or your child would like to find out more, this week is National Apprenticeship Week, and there are lots of websites which will give you further information and show live apprenticeship vacancies.

There is also support available within school or I can be contacted through Ms Davies if you or your child would like to find out more.

Library News

On Thursday we held our annual Harry Potter Book Night celebration in the library. Similar celebrations happen across the country and we marked the occasion by hosting a Triwizard Tournament. As students arrived at the library in their wizarding attire, they ran through platform $9^{3/4}$. The tournament itself then began with students throwing their name into the Goblet of Fire and accepting the challenges of the night ahead. They then assembled into teams representing five different schools in the wizarding world - Hogwarts, Beauxbatons, Durmstrang, Illvermorny and Mahoutokoro.

The first task of the evening tested their Harry Potter knowledge with students competing in a Harry Potter quiz. Jesus was a perfect example of this. He picked out the lonely, hated and rejected people of society and placed love and value on them. Love and value often being the things that would change people's lives.


As we go through this week, let's be determined to respect, honour and place value on the people around us, it works wonders.

Well done to Year 9 for having the highest attendance for week ending 31.01.2020.

Our school attendance for Years 7-11 for week ending 31.1.2020 was 91.15%, which is a considerable drop compared to the previous week. Please encourage your son/daughter to have good attendance and if they are absent for three or more consecutive days, we require medical evidence which can be in the form of off the counter medication, prescription, appointment notes etc.

The whole school attendance, including 6th Form, for week ending 31.1.2020 was 88.64%. Again, this is a decrease on last week's attendance.
