

Open Academy Update 16 October 2020 For parents and students – please do discuss the contents with your child!

On the whole, attendance has been good. Can we have a real push for the last few days of half term for students to get 100% attendance. All students with 100% attendance will be issued with a certificate and receive achievement points.

On a less positive note the trend for slapping each other round the head continues. We are disappointed that some students are not taking notice of the reminders and continue with this inappropriate behaviour. Detentions will be given to repeat offenders.

Also, students have been puncturing holes in the top of drink bottles, and then spraying each other with the contents. This is not acceptable behaviour, it has caused several students to have sticky items of clothing and liquid spilt on the floor causing a hazard and creating more work for the cleaning staff. 
8. UCAS Timeline

Students in sixth form might be wondering what their next steps are and how to achieve this. Students might decide to go into employment, take a gap year before beginning their next step, or go on to complete a degree either as a university student full time or as an apprenticeship (there are other levels of apprenticeship as well). Students considering going to university, might be wondering when they need to complete their application. I have included a timeline with key dates. It is great if students begin to prepare for an application in Year 12, these dates apply when your child is in Year 13. They complete an application which is sent off to UCAS – a centralised system. Their applications are then processed and sent away to the universities which have been applied for. Some courses have an earlier deadline, but school have set a deadline in December for all other applications to be completed.

The timeline mentions UCAS extra. Students can apply for 5 choices on their university application. UCAS extra happens after students have heard back from their universities. If the student is not holding any offers (either they were unsuccessful or they declined their offers) they can add another choice at a time using UCAS extra.

As part of the university application process, students must write a personal statement. This is their chance to write a short statement to tell the universities why they should be made an offer to study on their course. It has been great to see Year 13 virtually twice this week as myself and my UEA Outreach colleagues have discussed an introduction to personal statements and how to choose a course and university. I will discuss more about personal statements in a future newsletter.
