Dear Parents/Carers

Welcome to the newsletter this week.

In it you will find all of our usual updates and information and this week there is some key information regarding the external examination grading processes we will be using this year.

It is great to be back at the start of a term with everyone in and working. Yes, things are not quite as normal yet. The ventilation requirements have meant it has been pretty fresh in the academy this week, but face coverings are being observed incredibly well by all and all the rest of the COVID response change is now second nature.

Attendance has been great this week, once again above average, and home testing is being completed by the vast majority of your children as we return which is another reassuring sign, so with Hubs back in full swing now, it really does feel like this time we are now back for good.

I will mention at this point the amazing lockdown efforts last term made by many students but exemplified by Rebecca Shapcott in Year 7, whose folder of work representing all of the work she completed during lockdown 3, shows just what a comprehensive curriculum offer was available last term, not to mention the great dedication on her part to get it all done!

Year 11 and Year 13 Assessment Grades

I have asked Mr Ward to write to Year 11 and 13 today (see attached letter and <u>link</u>) to clarify the situation as regards assessment grades this year. The guidance is so late and piecemeal that it will take us a few more days to clarify exactly how things will work even for staff, so we may have sent a few mixed messages this week already which I would like to apologise for.

The key thing is to read the attached letter. It gives full and clear details of how we will be approaching assessments this year. Please be reassured that as this situation crystallises, we will do all we can to ensure your child gets the grades they deserve.

I will leave it with the summary from the letter:

- We are doing all we can to help your child get the grades they deserve.
- We do not intend to replace GCSEs with our own exam series as such. Mini exams and tests along with other information will add to the picture for each subject.
- The evidence used may vary from subject to subject depending upon the assessment evidence that each already holds.

3. PE Kits

As you may now know, our school uniform shop is shortly moving online, making it easier to purchase items for your son/daughter.

The PE department are also adding our kit to the same online shop. This will coincide with a change to our current PE kit and options available.

We have decided to change our PE kit for the coming year for many beneficial factors, including:

• Easier cleaning and drying, as the current white polo shirts get dirty very easily and can be more difficult to keep clean. Especially during winter.





- The thinner, black polo will be more user friendly for students and will use a training wear material, which supports air flow during exercise.
- The academy logo on the front will promote a greater sense of pride and togetherness when competing against other schools in sporting events.
- We will be in line with many other local schools in having our own designated PE kit.

To help support you as parents/carers, the following items can be purchased from our new online shop. However, the black, embroidered polo top will be the only compulsory item. All other kit can be purchased from elsewhere but must be sportswear and black. Our quarter zip, long sleeved top will not be embroidered but will be cheaper to purchase than most other clothing providers.

From September 2021, our PE kit will consist of:

- 1. Black Open Academy polo shirt, embroidered with the academy logo.
- 2. Black shorts/tracksuit bottoms.

4. Year 7 News

Learning Hubs commenced this week for Year 7s. They are run Monday to Thursday after school. The Hubs have been set up following the governments expectation that all students need to catch up on any work missed in lockdown. Students who have work outstanding have been asked to Hub sessions. The students asked to attend the sessions will be reviewed and regularly updated over the next few weeks. Some students only missed a little of the work, so will catch up quicker. Other students may be asked to attend if it is felt they need extra support.





In addition to the Hubs, the next knowledge organiser has been issued to the year group today. This contains the key content of all topics being taught this half term. Homework and assessments are based around the topics and is produced to support the learning in school.

Shout outs for this week: Hallie Chandler, Troy Notley and Charlie Mann for receiving the highest achievement points of the week. Riley Daniels – Miss Ling Reading, being an absolute star in reading. Not only did he read wonderfully, but he was also very supportive to others in the group.

Open Voice will be up and running over the next few weeks. We will be asking students to focus on antibullying, looking at ways to be supportive to each other continuing the #bekind theme we touched on before the end of last term.

5. Year 8 News

A mixed bag in terms of achievement and attendance this week which can partially be forgiven for our first full week back in lessons after the Easter break and lockdown 3, plus the exhaustion of being back in routine can bring. This particularly applies to students who are receiving regular detentions.

However, the actions of the few shouldn't overshadow the achievement of the many so I would like to congratulate the following students on excellent work and effort this week: Ella Ramm, Ashton Taylor, Leah-Louise Lovett, Scarlet Bush, Joel Walker, Deagan Walker, Andrew Coelho and Ariya Rashid. Praise postcards should be arriving with you shortly! The entire year group has collectively earnt 636 achievement points with a lot of those for LEARNT behaviour so well done!

Lastly, a final note about uniform. We are still seeing students arrive in leggings, trainers or incredibly short skirts/ties. Taking pride in our uniform makes for a better attitude towards learning and so if you have problems with obtaining or funding for proper school uniform, please contact the Year 8 office. Hubs after school commenced last week. Please remind your child to attend if they have a hub timetabled for them. We have detailed below Mr Ward's explanation of the hubs - nationally, lots of students did not do much, if any work, during lockdown. The government has made it clear that these students need to catch up. We are lucky that Open managed to get most students working well most of the time. Most students were able to continue to work with their teachers in a mixture of online learning and live lessons over the lockdown. Some students kept up to date by using the knowledge organisers and sending work in. Where work was not completed and learning was not happening then a gap opens up. It is not fair to the majority of students who did all the work to be held back by the minority who could not. If a student did not complete sufficient work during lockdown, then the sessions are to catch up. It would also mean that there is a chance that there is not enough time to teach all of the content in Key Stage 3 or in the GCSE or A-level specifications. Therefore, we must help the students catch up.

Some students have more sessions than others. In order to catch up the missing work it will take some students 2 hours per week for the year. Other students it will be 1 hour. Some students only missed a little bit and they will be caught up quicker.

Where a student completed sufficient work during lockdown they are usually not in Hub sessions. However, we will be offering some Engaged, Gifted and Talented after school slots for those pupils. They did very well. This programme will be relaunched in the summer term.

8. Year 11 News

A heart felt 'well done!' for Year 11 returning to lessons this week. They have come back into school, worked hard, been calm and very mature in their attitude towards their learning. There has been a slight decrease in the number of students attending Hub. I appreciate that some students feel they are not doing exams and so do not need to attend, however staff are using Hub sessions to recap work and prepare students for the coming assessments.

There has been a lot of confusion about how teachers will assess grades and different schools are taking different approaches. I realise that some students have been anxious about the lack of a formal assessment timetable. The reason for this is to allow the class teacher flexibility in planning the assessments to maximise student performance. We will have assessment windows of time. Teachers will prepare students for their assessment, informing them of the focus of the assessment and the assessment method, e.g. written verbal, practical.

Students will have more than one assessment window, this therefore allows students to prepare for and be assessed in different topics and in a variety of ways. Students' strongest work will then be used as the evidence to produce their grade. Grades given by the class teacher will then be verified by a chain of staff before being entered to ensure moderation and fairness.
