



# Open Academy Update 30 April 2021 For parents and students – please do discuss the contents with your child.

#### Dear Parents/Carers

Welcome to the newsletter this week – and I'll start by saying a huge thank you for your continued testing efforts. Whatever the national picture looks like, we have seen a sharp uptick in cases for us, with lateral flow tests detecting 4 unrelated cases before they have made it in to school over the last week or so. This could have been a problem, however, the fact that so many of you are regularly testing and informing us of the result means that we continue to keep it at bay. So as restrictions in society ease and hopefully you are able to get back to a bit more normal, please do keep the regular testing going.

Mr Ward will be writing to parents in Year 11 and 13 next week regarding our end of year arrangements as we look to secure the best evidence we can for grades and ensure that our students are as well prepared as possible for their next steps.

He will be clarifying that the 11 June will be the last official day of school, as that is at the end of our final assessment window, but he will clarify further how we will proceed where all evidence has been collected for a student before that date. He has asked me to remind you, however, that throughout the next few weeks it is vital that Year 11 attendance remains high and that they attend their lessons at all times.

I am also really excited to announce that in response to the pandemic, Open Academy is planning an innovative internship program for Year 11 students who are intending to stay with us in to Year 12 and departing Year 13 students.

# Year 11 and 13 Summer Internship program

The first phase of the program will be a training and support program for students to develop and prepare themselves for their next steps in education – either in higher education or training or work for Year 13s or preparation for further study with us for the Year 11s. Alongside this will be training to work as a peer teacher for the younger students on their catch up program in the final 3 weeks of the year – and on in to our planned summer schools for some.

The governors have agreed that a reward of a £75 Amazon voucher per student per successful week completed of the 3 week tutoring program in July, which will see our Year 11s and 13s support their junior peers before during and after school to succeed in projects and catch up learning. The best peer teachers will be offered the opportunity to remain for a further 2 weeks support during our summer school meaning that rewards of up to £375 per students will be on offer from the official leaving date until early August.

More details will be in Mr Ward's letter to parents next week along with further details about the rest of our end of year activities, including celebration events for Year 11 and 13 and prom.

I'm sorry we can't give full details yet but things are moving so quickly at the moment and we are keen to ensure the most ambitious and exciting program we can for all year groups as we progress through the summer term especially for Year 11 and 13 as we are keen to prepare them for their next steps – so watch out for Mr Ward's letter early next week!



I just want to start this week by talking about a man who I greatly admire and respect. He's not a famous or well-known person, in fact he is just like you and me.
