



Open Academy Update 21 May 2021 For parents and students – please do discuss the contents with your child.

Dear Parents/Carers

Welcome to our newsletter this week.

I would like to use my newsletter introduction this week to highlight our student leadership program and the Academy Open Voice year and Academy Councils.

Each year towards the end of the first half term, the year teams run a process to identify student leaders. Once identified student leaders can apply for student executive roles like Head Boy and Girl, their deputies, Charities, Sports or Learning leads. During the year these students step up to perform roles such as prefects, ambassadors, Academy tour guides and interviewers.

Year groups leaders meet half termly to discuss year issues and planning organising events and activities and then the Head Boy and Girl from each year group come together in the Open Voice Academy Council which was finally able to meet in person this week.

We aim for these to be full formal meetings and provide a cooked breakfast for the students as they arrive. This term we discussed a range of issues raised by the students including how we should respond to some big national issues including the Black Lives Matter campaign, the Sarah Everard protests and other equality issues. We have decided we will be running awareness activities in the new academic year and ensuring these issues are given more prominence in our curriculum.

We also discussed our response to bullying, our new introduction of anti-bullying contracts and further activities that we might wish to undertake. We agreed to develop our relationships curriculum input, to plan a campaign week in September when we first come back, we have launched an anti bullying poster competition and have a further range of suggested activities that we will be working through.

The students also agreed a proposal to consider donating uniform which is in good condition, but which no longer fits to the school to pass on to people who may need it, so we will be in touch about this shortly.

Finally, we were able to agree that The British Heart Foundation would benefit from any fund-raising excess to the Academy's needs this year and the year teams will be talking to their groups about who we should be supporting from September.

COVID-19 has affected our response to the student voice somewhat, but I'm hoping that we are now back and re-establishing a strong culture of student feedback.

And that leads me on to my final note this week. It is absolutely vital as the wearing of masks in schools is eased that you continue to lateral flow test your child twice per week. The cases seem to be rising again and we are keen as ever to do all we can to keep the community safe. Remember, COVID symptoms - keep your child home and get a PCR test - the lateral flow is for people without symptoms.

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1. Year 7 News

This week saw our first after school extra curriculum activity for a while. A group of Year 11s ran a Kin Ball tournament to help raise money for Prom. Students who took part in the tournament on Monday after school, were fantastic and all really enjoyed the event. Thank you for your support.

The year group have all had a virtual assembly this week with Miss Whitwood and Mrs Lamb. The assembly covered behaviour with a focus on anti-bullying and a focus on cyber- bullying. The students then finished off by being shown a short video telling them what they need to do if they are being bullied or if inappropriate comments have been made on social media.

We have again seen playfighting at social time, a number of students have now been spoken to by the senior leadership team. Playfighting can cause serious injury and if any student continues to participate in any playfighting we will be following the behaviour policy.

Attendance has dropped this week. There are clear government guidelines for schools that say when children should be kept off school and when they shouldn't. There is guidance on the NHS website which includes information on common childhood illnesses where school is missed when it needn't be. It is vital to follow this, as we will not authorise your child's absence if we feel they are well enough to be in school (this could lead to consequences for parents/carers, which we would like to avoid. In order to keep all of your child's details up to date, please let school know of any change of address, telephone numbers etc. In addition, if there are any changes to medical conditions, allergies, food tolerances etc, these are also to be notified to us.

You can update your details using the Parent App as well as informing us direct.

This ensures students are actively reading and prompts them to process what they have read and pick out the main points. Completing this every day will help students remember their book in more detail and aide understanding of the book as a whole.

As some of you will already know, we will be updating our PE kit from September. Further information will be available on our website in the coming weeks.



Well done to those year groups highlighted, who have the highest attendance for the week.


