#### Dear Parents/Carers

Firstly, please see the attached letter I am sending regarding the new guidelines issued by the government that means from Monday all students should wear a face covering.

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# 1. National Tutoring Programme - Catch Up Tutoring

You may have heard in the press that the government has put in place a national tutoring programme. Open Academy is presently in the process of bidding for support for those students who are eligible. Should we be successful the students will be selected according to the criteria as laid out by the Department for Education and the companies that they have employed. The sessions will take place in groups of between 1 and 3. The expectation from the Department for Education is that the sessions should usually take place before school or after school. The details are, as yet, unknown as each company has different operating procedures. Some sessions may be in the school day and some may be virtual.

The sessions cost between £150 and £300 per student and this cost will be met in full by the Academy and the government subsidy. As you can imagine, if your child is eligible and we are fortunate to secure both the funding and the staffing, then it is vital that your child engages fully with the programme - there will not be enough places for the need nationally, so we must make full use of what we are given so that none of the funding is wasted.

No further action is required on your part at this time, those who are eligible will be contacted once we have confirmed places.



#### 8. Apprenticeships

If you have a child considering next steps, they might be considering an apprenticeship. An apprenticeship involves on the job training with study, so your child gains qualifications whilst earning a wage.

Apprenticeship levels:

Intermediate Apprenticeship	Advanced Apprenticeship	Higher and Degree Apprenticeships
Level 2	Level 3	Level 4 – 7
12 – 18 months	18 – 24 months	Usually a minimum of 24 months
Equivalent to 5 GCSEs 4-9	Equivalent to 2 A Levels	Equivalent to a degree, depending on level taken

In the same way as at school or Sixth Form, they study at a different level depending on their qualifications – for example they can study for a degree apprenticeship without having completed an advanced apprenticeship as long as they meet the entry requirements set by the apprenticeship. This would most likely include having level 3 qualifications/equivalent of.

If you or your child would like to know more, there are lots of websites with information and support available within school. I am talking about apprenticeships next week with Year 13 too. I can also be contacted through Ms Davies if you or your child have any questions.



#### 11. Chaplain's Reflection

#### Remembrance

"They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them."

Laurence Binyon, For The Fallen

As we approach the 11 of November we remember, think of and give thanks for all the British service members who have died in wars and other military conflicts since the onset of World War one. It is a time of reflection where we can be thankful for the freedom that we have because of their sacrifice. We thank God for every one of them.

Remembering can be a painful experience as well as a positive one for many of us. The pain of the past can stick around for a long time and can cause us great suffering. We can also choose to remember all of the good times as well, the good experiences that we have had along the way.

I want to encourage you to focus on remembering the good times and dwell on them even at times when you don't feel like it. I am reminded of a story from the Bible which brings this out. After Moses had led the nation of Israel out of slavery from Egypt, they still had many obstacles to overcome. One was to get through a massive river of which they had no way of crossing, to get to the land that God had promised them.

The Bible says that God miraculously stopped its flow upriver so that Israel was able to cross over on dry land. They then built a memorial out of stones at the place where they crossed over, to commemorate this miraculous occasion. This place was called Gilgal and they used it as a base in their mission for freedom. From then on, even when they faced difficult times in their quest for freedom and felt like giving up, they would come back to Gilgal, see the stones and would be reminded of the miracle that took place there. They would then be encouraged to keep going on.

In closing, when things get difficult, remember the good times and all the positive things that have happened. They often free us from and help us to forget the painful times of the past.
