Dear Parents/Carers and Students

Welcome to our newsletter this week and what a week it has been. Although conducted in a very strict COVID controlled, all seated, all ticketed and highly ventilated (pretty chilly) fashion, we did actually manage to put on our 'Open's Got Talent' talent competition, which was a fantastic evening of entertainment (and a good test event for the Carol Concert – coming up on Thursday, 9 December at 6.30pm).

It has been so frustrating trying to work around the pandemic in terms of performances and even now, the new advice is that we must once again revert to online parents' evenings. We were able to deliver Open's Got Talent after strict controls were introduced and a tight risk assessment completed, which will be tweaked and tightened a little more for the Carol Concert. Again, we are being allowed to do this as long as our case numbers remain low and we update and finalise the risk assessment just before the event.

It was well worth the risk assessment for Open's Got Talent though, as we were treated to 10 fantastic acts of signing dancing, music and Rubik's cubing (?!?). Miss Lines did a fantastic job of preparing and supporting the acts and bringing the evening together, and lots of staff and students gave their time to help set up, prepare and support. I was privileged to be asked to judge along with Miss Reed and Miss Ormosi and we had the impossible job of picking a judge's winner. The audience too got to pick their 'people's choice' winner and with such tough choices after such great performances, the voting was very close. The singing, guitar playing Lucy won the judges award, narrowly beating Rea who choreographed and danced her way through a fantastic performance. Dahlia and Toby were chosen as the people's choice winners, but it is fair to say that the biggest winners on the night were the audience who had a marvellous time. The supportive and encouraging atmosphere meant it was fine to have a go and many more of the acts will be off polishing their performances for next year!

That of course will be COVID permitting, and on that theme I would once again like to thank you for your careful and supportive approach to the community. The vast majority of you continue the twice weekly lateral flow tests and if there is a positive test you let us know and keep your child home for a PCR. In this way we are managing to keep our numbers incredibly low – at one point this week we had only 1 case isolating. So, your continued efforts are most appreciated.

We are still hoping to take the Year 7 students over to St Francis Church on the last day of term for a 'lessons and carols' service to get them in the swing of things. Given the size of the church and the COVID risk, we had hoped to invite parents too, but that will not be possible this year. On the plus side however, we believe we do have a robust risk assessment enough to ensure we can run our carol concert. Inevitably it will have to be an all ticket event and there will be COVID restrictions which we will publish right before the event – just as we did for the Open's Got Talent event. However, please do book tickets and come along. For many people it is the most 'Christmassy' thing they do and it does kick off the festive season so well.

Oh, and while I'm at it, Mark would not forgive me if I didn't mention donations for the Christmas hampers. Your child should have received a list of what we are collecting, it is very specific goods to make a Christmas dinner as opposed to general tinned goods, which we struggle to use.

I shall stop there and hope you enjoy the rest of the newsletter as you enjoy Children in Need this year. There is a very relaxed atmosphere in the Academy today in non-uniform for Pudsey, and I am delighted to see so many students supporting our anti-bullying drive by wearing odd socks today. Students leaders attended an anti-bullying conference with Mr Wilkinson yesterday and you should get a chance to read all about that shortly and what else we will be doing to challenge bullying in the school, for now, have a great week.

3. Year 8 News

Wow!! How are we only four weeks away until we break up for Christmas! Students are working hard and have really settled into the life of Year 8. They are starting to adjust well to sharing their lunchtime with Year 9, after having almost a year of it being just them! One thing that we would like to remind students of, is that during lunchtime, students need to be sat down in the lecture theatre or outside. Students should not be walking around the Academy. This is because there are lessons taking place due to the split lunches and we are doing our best to avoid the learning of others being disrupted.

Year 8 are still top of the leaders board for achievement points. We are now over 14,500 achievement points, which is fantastic. Keep up the hard work. There will be trips coming up for students who have achieved the most LEARNT points, the best homework and made the most improvements in a range of areas.

The average Rubrics score which has been given to Year 8 so far is between a 3-4. This is what students should be aiming to achieve for each piece of homework. I spoke to a couple of parents this week, who were unsure what to look for when homework had been returned to students. You are looking for a score of 1-4. Rubrics score 1 means that homework wasn't submitted or that it showed very little or no understanding, 2 means students showed little understanding on the topic/homework set, 3 and 4 shows that student have shown good (3) or excellent (4) understanding. We encourage students to take the correct time on their homework so that they can achieve 3s and 4s on the Rubrics. If you are ever unsure, please don't hesitate to contact us as we would be happy to talk you through it.

A reminder that if your child has HUB on their timetable they should be attending. This is a supportive session, and is there to help students complete homework to a high standard.
