

#### Open Academy Update 3 December 2021 For parents and students – please do discuss the contents with your child.

Dear Parents/Carers and Students

Welcome to this week's newsletter and this week I would like to start as I often do, with a thank you!

Your amazing generosity has meant that last week we raised £333.50 for Children in Need. Despite the backdrop of such economic challenges being faced in our community, that is an excellent result. Mr Ward and I grew moustaches for the 'Movember' men's health campaign and thanks to the generosity of our colleagues and friends, have raised £240 for the charity which works to raise the profile of Men's Cancers and Men's Mental health. I am also delighted to see lots of Christmas hampers coming together in various form areas and staff rooms. Having been the recipient of Christmas charity when I was younger, and knowing what a difference it made for us, I can only say thank you on behalf of those in need. Whatever you can give is appreciated.

Still on the subject of charity, this year, our Academy Student Council – Open Voice – have brought together the views of the Year Councils and, in a busy council meeting this week, agreed that this year, the charities to be supported by the Academy would be, Cancer Research, WaterAid, and a homegrown charitable cause – the Year 11 prom. So most of our charitable activities will be split between those three causes until next academic year.

The Academy Council were delighted to welcome Callum Perry, our latest governor recruit, who attended the meeting as an observer. As his focus is student voice, this was a good introduction for him to see the students in action, and he left commenting on how well the students discussed, debated and built on each other's ideas and suggestions.

Topics discussed included feedback from a recent anti-bullying conference many had attended, with some more ideas and actions for the Academy to put in place. The students appreciated the new LGBTQ+ Rainbow and the Black Lives Matter Banners now proudly hanging from the atrium ceiling, both symbolising our commitment to equality which the Student Council had requested to sit alongside our values. (I did not share the rigmarole of my Monday evening after the Academy closed trying to put the banners up using my fishing rod! Mr Wilkinson, Miss Wenlock and I got there eventually but I have 4 more banners to go to put up the rest of our values, and I'm not looking forward to another session. Casting line is easy when I'm pointing at the sea but much trickier when there are internal windows I could break! Never mind, the first two new banners are up and the students were very pleased.

Finally, on the charity thoughts, as is becoming the tradition, alongside the Christmas Hampers appeal, we also support Christmas Jumper day. This year ,Christmas Jumper Day, in aid of Save the Children, will be on 10 December 2021. Students can choose to wear their Christmas jumper along with their normal uniform for a suggested donation of £1. This should not, however, mean rushing out and buying a jumper. Invariably, the most popular jumpers are the ones that people have homemade with old Christmas decorations, just as long as there are no glass baubles or anything requiring mains electricity. I hope to see some creative efforts again this year.

I will close with a COVID update. We have seen a sharp uptick in cases again this week, over 20, which means it is definitely still about in our community. We have taken a range of steps as per guidance from the government to limit the spread so we are no longer doing face-to-face assemblies, the Year 7 disco and end of term church service have all had to be cancelled and we are not even meeting in person as a staff team from last Tuesday. I am still hopeful that our Carol Concert can go ahead albeit with reduced numbers, however, I will do a final risk assessment and consult with the Trust on Monday. There may well then be further safety instructions assuming we go ahead, however we will see what the weekend brings. So, please keep twice-weekly testing and, please enjoy the rest of our newsletter.

#### 3 Year 7 News

It has been significantly colder this week and not only have we felt this in the school building but also in PE. Please ensure that your child has suitable clothes for PE outdoors. Unless the weather makes PE unsafe, we will take lessons outside throughout the year. Students are permitted to wear a black or navy sweatshirt or fleece and jogging bottoms. No other colours are permitted and if students wish to wear leggings, they must be sports leggings to ensure that they are not see through and suitable for sports activities.

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Thank you for your generosity in donating items for the Christmas hampers. If you have not yet donated, there is still time.

Last year, we noticed a rise in Covid infections as we approached Christmas, possibly related to the weather being colder and us spending more time inside. We have a number of measures in place to reduce the risks to students and therefore our families. We have a one-way system in place and ask students to be in specific places, such as the Atruim, at break and lunch. We cannot have students just wandering around as this increases the risks. We have also asked students to wear masks when they can. I am pleased to say that Year 7 have been very respectful in complying with this. We have had to remind them to wear them or put them over the mouth and nose, but this has to be expected as we get back into the habit of wearing them again. Some students in the Academy have very vulnerable family members at home and so we greatly appreciate the support of all students in reducing the risk of spreading Covid where we can. Please keep testing regularly. Many of our cases are being identified through the LFT when there are no symptoms.

If a student runs out of money on their dinner money account, we do permit a small overdraft. Please can you check with your child and ask them to let you know if their account needs topped up to avoid this happening. If there are any problems, please call and let us know and we will do our best to help. As of January 2022, we will be a cashless school and all items will have to be paid for online. This includes trips and visits, as well as lunch money. Please check that your account is set up to avoid any inconvenience.


