

# Open Academy Update 29 April 2022 For parents and students – please do discuss the contents with your child.

Dear Parents/Carers and Students

Welcome to our newsletter this week.

We are well and truly in to the summer term now and as we are finally able to start our assembly program in person again, I have taken the opportunity to reflect on where we have been as an academy, how we have improved and then to look at where we are going next. I thought you may be interested in that quick overview too so I will summarise the key messages below.

Over the last two or three years – despite the pandemic - we have taken big steps forward to improve the academy

- Our curriculum has been fully reviewed and improved, we now provide knowledge organisers for key stage 3 and assessment folders for marked work in all key stages.
- We have gone from around 10-15% of students completing around 1.5 to 2 hours of homework per week 2 years ago to over 75% completion of all homework with an expectation of national average 4.5 hours per week for all.
- We have been developing the Open Way To Teaching and Learning which uses best practice research to help students learning through a cycle of: frequent practice recall, clear explanation, modelling, examples and then opportunities to practice and apply new knowledge.
- We simplified our Inclusive Open Way Behaviour policy based on support and with the three clear rules of being ready, safe and respectful, and introduced a behaviour for learning training program based on LEARNT (Listen, Engage, Ask & Answer, Respect, Now be 'present' and Teamwork). All our positive behaviour points in lessons are gained from this program and these points feed into a new refreshed rewards program.
- We have introduced and developed a new pastoral system, which has year teams consisting of assistant heads of year / heads of year and tutors.
- We have significantly more support in lessons.
- We have widened the curriculum to include more trips visits and activities (COVID permitting) and introduced an EBacc expectation at key stage 4.
- Our statistics tell us there is much less bullying and less distraction in lessons.
- We promote and support diversity through our student lead Unite Open and Open LGBTQ+ groups to help everyone feel welcome.
- We have developed an 'it can happen here' approach to sexual harms, and through both pastoral support and our skills for life curriculum we have worked hard to ensure that everyone has someone they can go to if they feel they have been treated inappropriately.
- Thanks to our lockdown work on tracking progress and our continued use of TEAMS for homework, we became a Microsoft Showcase school one of less than 50 in the country who go through the rigorous assessment process.

Which altogether feels like a lot of positive progress! I also outlined in my assemblies how we are changing now for improvement including:

- Mobile phones back to the future we will be rigorously reinforcing our long-standing mobile phone policy.
- Outdoor space we hope students enjoy using the better spaces outdoors this summer, but please respect the space stay clear of the pond and fence around it.
- Green card tweaks this is the way we try to support students who are struggling we have introduced a few tweaks to improve how it works.
- Uniform tweak thanks to a successful campaign by the student leaders at Open Voice, our academy council, if you are allowed a nose piercing, you may wear one stud in the academy.
- More awards and rewards we will be holding a key stage 3 awards ceremony this term COVID permitting – and we will continue with the new breakfast and lunch rewards for highest attendance and highest achievement points.



We know that we still have much to do, but as we get on top of lesson behaviour, homework and uniform, it is right that we continue to improve as above starting with phone use.

I have also asked Mr Ward to reflect on some of our successes as we return from the pandemic and you will find his thoughts below and attached with the newsletter.

I will go back to the more day to day next week, but I hope you have found this reminder / update helpful – and as always, I am keen to hear your feedback. On that note, after a suggestion from a parent that we might provide some training around some key issues for parents – like autism or child mental health, I am investigating what we might be able to offer and would be delighted to hear what you think of the suggestions – or indeed which courses we should be offering – for now that is quite enough from me – so please do enjoy the rest of this newsletter.

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### 1. Open Success

#### Year 7 and 9

The next round of GL Assessments will take place in June. There will be written reports on the progress of all pupils this year with targets on how to improve in maths and English. These will supplement the full reports. Pupils can revise or catch up using knowledge organisers. There is a new one every half term. By the end of the year there will be 6 documents clearly showing everything that has been taught in the year. Where students are not making enough progress overall additional support e.g. compulsory HUB sessions are put in place.

#### Year 8

We are compiling the results from the last set of assessments. Due to the pandemic there was higher than usual absence of pupils and we are trying to catch those pupils up. Reports will follow in the coming weeks.

#### Year 9

Options forms are being collected. There was a confusion with a minority of pupils regarding choice. It is government policy and expectation that students follow the EBacc and therefore it would be a very unusual situation for a particular pupil not to be studying English, maths, science, German, and a humanity (history or geography). To be clear those circumstances would be learning needs i.e. a special educational need rather than preference. It was different in the past. Where there is freedom to choose pupils have 12 GCSEs to pick from. The most popular 10 will run.

#### Year 10

Year 10 are taking doing assessments during May. Reports will follow at the end of the month. Those not on track will be added to compulsory HUB sessions to catch up.



#### Year 11

Before half term the timetable will adapt slightly to enable students to be with key teachers before exams. After half term some subjects will be completed and therefore more timetable changes will be done in order to maximise the time the students can spend with the key teacher. It is not possible to be perfect due to teachers having multiple exam groups and the exams themselves making timetabling challenging. However, if we can squeeze an extra hour or two work in we will do so. Please be mindful that the disruption will lead to pupils being with their teachers more often.

Details of the internship programme and work experience are being finalised. Exciting times ahead...

#### Sixth Form

So many of you are taking exams for the first time now. Please be mindful of each other and where someone needs support make sure we are aware. It is sometimes not easy to spot worries when you are studying at home! Email your teachers so that you can get answers to questions you may have.

## 3. Year 8

After the holidays, and a shorter first week last week, it has been good to get properly back in the swing of things this week. As always, the vast majority of Year 8 have been motivated to do their best and maximise their progress, and have shown dedication, determination, resilience, and an excellent attitude towards their lessons. With the bank holiday this weekend, and a shorter week to follow, this half-term is going to fly by... and we will soon be hitting Year 9!

We are always proud to be associated with this year group, and genuinely believe that we set the standards in the school for behaviour and progress. It is absolutely vital that we continue this, and strive to

be even better, in order to ensure that the very best personal and academic standards and development can be achieved. As such, we would like to ask students to think about their strengths and areas for development, and identify one area where they think they can push themselves to achieve even more. A target could be as simple as putting up your hand every lesson, asking a teacher a question about their subject inside or outside of the classroom each day, or looking to raise your average homework score by one point. Setting your own goals, and reflecting on how this can impact on your confidence and understanding, is a powerful tool both at school and in the world beyond.

A few reminders going forward to next week:

Seeing Mrs Lamb – Mrs Lamb is incredibly busy. You should speak to her before school, or in social times if you need to speak to her, or arrange a time to speak to her. She has now added a sign-up sheet on her office door: if you go to the office and she is not there, write your name on the sheet and return/go to your lesson. Mrs Lamb will be aware that you wish to speak to her, and will come to you when she is able.

Phones – students have responded extremely well to the re-introduction of the phones policy. Posters are due to be going up around the school to reinforce this. Phones should be turned off and placed in students' bags, not in pockets. We are thankful to parents and guardians for their support of this policy, which is designed to keep you safe, happy, and focused on learning in school.

Break time – please remember to stay away from the nature area and the fences at break time. Ball games should be played on the hard courts only. There are deer living in the nature area who we want to take care of, and not worry or disturb, and we need to make sure that there is no possibility of any balls going out on to the main road.

Uniform expectations – these are simple and clear and have been communicated. The vast majority get them right every day. Everyone can get them right every day.

### 4. Year 9

Hubs are again running, but now just once a week for each student who is timetabled to go. Please check your child's timetable to know when they are meant to be attending. If they miss a session they will be receiving a 30-minute detention the next day. These sessions are important to ensure all students complete



their courses. If they have no work to complete then they will just need to get registered at Hub and then they will be able to leave.

There has been a growing concern with online safety in regards to mobile phones at school. Some students have been using them inappropriately by taking photos of others without permission, others have been sharing videos online. This now means that the school has returned to its previous policy towards phones, where they should not be seen or heard while in the building. If you need to contact your child whilst at school please do so via reception or Mrs Smith. Please do not contact your child directly as this could get them into trouble or at the least distract them from their learning. Please allow us to contact you if there is something we need to share or inform you about your child as well, for example if they are ill and need to come home. If you have any questions please get in contact with either Mrs Smith or Mr Pickup.

The options process has now fully begun with forms being distributed to students this week. Students will need to have a last think about the choices they want to make before completing their forms. These will then be handed back into the Mrs Smith in the Year 9 office. If you have any questions then please get in contact with either the subject teacher or Mrs Smith. An exciting opportunity for a Year 11 or Year 13 student is currently available with local employer CTS. They are a structural engineering drawing office based on Hill House Road in Thorpe Hamlet, Norwich and have a position (or maybe two) available for a trainee/apprentice. They are looking for a school or sixth form leaver who is interested in Computer Aided Design within the Construction Industry. They are keen to recruit locally and are contacting all high schools and sixth forms in the area. The company specialise in 3D modelling of steel frame buildings of all types and sizes as well as architectural steelwork such as stairs and balconies. They work for structural engineers and steel manufacturers both locally and nationally. All training will be provided in house to BCSA (British Constructional Steel Association) guidelines.

Unfortunately, there are no government or Construction Industry Training Board apprenticeship schemes covering our trade and there are no qualifications to be gained. This is however, a much in demand skill and the experience gained will be invaluable within the construction industry. The job is mostly office based, but they do carry out measurement surveys so there would be a requirement for construction site visits on occasion. This provides the opportunity to train in the use of Total Station electronic distance and level measurement equipment.
