

# **Open Academy Update 4 November 2022**

Dear Parents, Carers and students.

Welcome to this week's newsletter.

Firstly, this week I would like to draw your attention to the attached letter regarding the publication of our Ofsted report from our inspection in June 2022 as this has now been published. The attached letter has all the relevant information and has a link to our website where you can read the report in full. It does feel a long time ago now – just as we were recovering from the pandemic outbreak that saw us having to close the school to pairs of year groups at a time due to staff absence and high rates of virus infection. Thankfully we have moved on significantly since then.

I apologise for the avalanche of paperwork this week. I also need to share with you the trust admissions policy for the year ahead. This is an important document which must be accurate given that we have been oversubscribed with first choices both last year and for the year ahead. The letter from the trust is self-explanatory about how you can feedback regarding the update. In essence however, there is no substantive changes in the effect of the policy so I am assuming there is nothing controversial to note here.

It is a busy time at the academy, however there has still been time for light relief. I was a little concerned when I was told we had a dinosaur running amok on the top floor, however one of my senior team was able to repair the fence and turn the electricity back on in true Jurassic park style (well persuade the 6<sup>th</sup> Form fundraisers to keep the fun until break time). I was stuck in meetings, however, the dinosaur was entertaining students at breaktime by playing the piano – all in the name of fund raising for their National Citizenship program.

Next week will see our Year 11 Awards Evening where class of '22, our best ever year for GCSE progress, will receive awards and their GCSE certificates. As always, we look forward to catching up with some familiar faces and finding out the next steps of those who have not chosen to stay with us.

Finally, on Friday, 11 November from 10.40am we will be holding a remembrance service in the Open Ark to mark the Armistice, which will culminate in 2 minutes of silence at 11am. I am pleased to say that thanks to a shipmate of Frank Armes – who is memorialised in the Open Ark, we will have a bugler for the last post and we hope to receive an artefact from the Ark Royal on which Frank served before his fateful posting on HMS Coventry from which he was sadly lost. Later in the day, I will take a group of student leaders to a service in Costessey, near where Frank lived, where a memorial bench is being unveiled. Huge thanks to Mr Gavin Scott, Frank's shipmate, and members of Frank's family who will be in attendance at both events, for allowing us to be part of the commemorations of this true local hero.

### 1. Safeguarding

We are aware that over the past year or so the Discord app has become increasingly popular, especially with young people; using it as a way to communicate with friends via message, voice or video chat. We have collated a few tips for students using the app:

#### 1. Discuss how to behave on the internet.

The anonymity of social media can lead children to behave in ways they wouldn't otherwise. Tell your child about the seriousness of cyber-bullying and sending nudes.

2. Talk about your standards and expectations.



Remember that Discord is all about how you use it. What servers are they allowed to join: only people they know in real life or other servers by interest? Who are they allowed to direct message?

## 3. Go through Discord's safety settings together.

Follow Discord's Four Steps to a Super Safe Account to turn on direct message filtering and limit who can send them direct messages. Remember that **there are no parental controls on Discord**, so your child can change these settings at any time.

## 4. Teach your child to be suspicious of unsolicited invites.

Pornography and predators may sneak in via server invites they didn't request, have never heard of, and have low membership. They should also **reject friend requests they weren't expecting.** 

## 5. Make a game plan for dealing with bullying or adult content.

Make sure your child knows they won't be in trouble or lose access to the app if they report a problem to you. You want to be on their side, not have them dealing with the dangers of Discord on their own where predators might manipulate them. Go over Discord's reporting procedures. Make sure they know how to block users. Blocking removes a person from your friend list. The message history remains (which they should share with you), but they cannot send any further messages.

## 6. Set a follow-up appointment to check out your teen's Discord every few weeks.

Make sure the safety features are still enabled. Check out what servers they are on and take a glance at their friends and direct messages. Ask them if anything on Discord has made them feel uncomfortable or unsafe.


