Dear Parents/Carers and Students

Welcome to this week's newsletter

This week I want to focus on my recent communication regarding our decision to apply to become a Church of England status academy.

Firstly, I would like to thank those who have already completed the online feedback form, or chosen to email directly with comments. It is good to see that so far people are warmly in favour.

For those of you who are unsure, I will highlight what I said in the letter you should have received by email earlier this week and attached again - that I believe Church of England designation is the best, indeed only way of ensuring that Open Academy remains an inclusive school for its local community as it guarantees our Christian ethos in a way that is fully protected.

It is strange to think that the Christian ethos was a key controversial element of the new academy's proposal back in the 'noughties' as the plan for a new academy to replace the old Heartsease High was formulated. I know back then some feared that the Christian nature might be used to exclude local students in favour of those with a religious background.

How things have changed. Firstly, it is clear that our admissions policy is open and fairly and squarely aimed at supporting all in our local community. Moreover, having looked in to the possibility of re-brokering, which would clearly have altered the academy's ethos, it has become clear that the Christian drive has been the main stay in keeping us inclusive for all in our local community. Becoming a full Church of England school secures that Christian ethos for the future, but will affect no other aspect of our work or curriculum, except we will also be inspected by the Church of England, to ensure we are operating within the expectations of our ethos – which is exactly what we want!

Parent voice will be really important to the regional director of education in making this decision, so it is key that if you have a view, I really do encourage you to share it.

I may not have answered your questions fully (save to say nothing will change day to day) so if you have questions or thoughts you have three ways to proceed – you can do any, all or just one, or none.

Finally, you can also attend our first parent partnership event of the term – next Tuesday, 19 September at 6pm where I will give a brief (literally 5 minute) presentation on re-designation and then take questions and feedback/thoughts from parents.

So, a simple clarifying change, that secures our local inclusive ethos into the future – what do you think – let us know via the online form/email/event?

Moving on from that but related, as we put the rest of the parent partnership program for the year together, I would be particularly keen to hear from you as to what sessions you would like us to put on. The revision/study skills for KS4 students' event was very popular last year – so that is definitely going to happen again – as is the how to support students with SEND. There are other sessions that we would like to run, but I am very keen that you let us know what would be most helpful to you.

That's definitely enough from me, save to say thank you all and keep up the excellent uniform approach – almost all getting it right now. A plea for the few though – shirts are tucked in so absolutely no leggings please!



7. Year 11 After School Revision/Intervention

From Monday, 18 of September, we will be implementing our planned intervention/revision sessions with Year 11 students to support them in their GCSE courses and preparations for their mock and final GCSE exams. 

Looking for Youth Conservation Volunteers!

Introducing Ents, brought to you by Wheatfen Forest School and South Yare Wildlife Group. Ents is for high school aged people (11-16) in Norfolk.

Do you love the outdoors and want to connect with people who share your interests? Are you considering taking GCSE Natural History or training for a job in nature post 16? Would like to build your tool skills? Are suffering from ecoanxiety? If so, helping nature in a practical way could also help you to feel better. Whatever your motivation – nature needs you!





How does it work? We arrange a work party roughly every 6 weeks at a weekend or in school holidays at a wild space in the South Yare area, within a 10-mile radius of Norwich. Once you have registered your interest, you will join a pool of volunteers who will be invited to come to each work party via email. RSVP to say whether or not you can come along. You don't have to come to every one, and it is free to take part! There are 15 spaces per work party.

What happens at a work party? Ents carry out conservation tasks such as clearing woodland scrub; removing invasive, non-native plants from the Broads; raking reed litter and having a bonfire; planting trees; digging ponds; or doing a Bioblitz to identify plants and animals, and help landowners make plans that will improve the biodiversity of their land.
