Welcome to our weekly newsletter.

I would like to start this week by drawing attention to the extension of our consultation period for the consultation on whether we should formally become a Church of England Academy. We think this is a good idea as it formalises and clarifies our inclusive Christian ethos for our community as being the drive to ensure the young people of Heartsease – of all faiths and none have access to this great academy.

I am copying the consultation letter in with this newsletter with the extended deadline to capture comments from anyone who has not yet had the chance. Thank you to everyone who has so far shared their opinion. Whilst we do not have any further consultation events planned, if you would like to discuss this proposal with me, please do contact me via the school office and I will be happy to arrange a discussion and to collect your thoughts in person.

With the student body firmly in favour through the school council and staff fully behind the proposal, I am pleased that by far the vast majority of people are understanding this proposal as a means of securing our inclusive Christian ethos for the future. Over the years of the new Open Academy we have developed a reputation for being an integral part of our local community, which we see ourselves as here to serve. I am recommending this change in the spirit of that local service – remember, re-designation will have no effect on admissions or our methods – this is to secure what we do now! I will be pleased to take your views right up until Friday, 13 October, or you can contact me at any point during that period for a conversation to add your view.

The other subject I would like to discuss this week is last night's Open Evening. These are important events in the life of the academy as they ensure a full intake for the next academic year. Moreover, they are an opportunity for us to see ourselves at our best and what a best.

We had over 80 students volunteer to come in and help the academy present itself as well as possible. I can honestly say I could not have been prouder of the students - immaculately turned out and bursting with enthusiasm and confidence – every single volunteer was a total credit to yourselves and the academy. Staff put on a great event, but it would not happen without the student helpers, demonstrators and tour guides.

I must especially mention the 5 students who helped me with the talks. With almost 3 halls full of parents, talking to the prospective students could be quite daunting, but all of the students who prepared their own speeches were great. Tilly in Year 7 did a great job in talking about the first few weeks and our transition program, Ella and Ella were superb in sharing about our fab canteen and also our trips visits and extracurricular activities. Areen spoke very professionally about student leadership and I could not be more proud of how Wiktoria described her classroom learning experience – it would have made the teachers blush!

The feedback I received on the evening was incredibly positive about how wonderful it is to see so many happy and engaged staff and students. As we continue on our improvement journey, it is nice to reflect that this is the day to day experience of the vast majority of people for the overwhelming majority of the time. Yes, there are always challenges along the way, however, it is fantastic to work in a place where so many are working to create such a positive strong community!

So, to all the staff and volunteers last night – thank you, your efforts are greatly appreciated!

2. Fundraising

Open Academy has been successful with an application to be included in the Tesco blue token voting. From the first week in October until mid-January you should see us named on the voting containers in local Tesco stores, so please support us next time you shop at Tesco!

Depending on the number of votes we get we will receive a grant towards the running of our breakfast club of up to £1,500. We are fortunate to be part of the National School Breakfast programme which subsidies some of the cost of the bagels and cereal, but the weekly cost is still approximately £30 plus the additional costs in providing the milk, margarine and fruit. We don't charge for our breakfast offer so rely on sponsorship and fundraising to provide this.



4. Year 9


Year 9 shout outs to:

5. Year 10



11. Chaplain's Reflection

I read this wonderful story this morning and would like to share it with you. It's called the perfect mistake.

My mother's father worked as a carpenter. On this particular day, he was building some crates for the clothes his church was sending to orphanages in China. On his way home, he reached into his shirt pocket to find his glasses, but they were gone. When he mentally replayed his earlier actions, he realised what had happened; the glasses had slipped out of his pocket unnoticed and fallen into one of the crates, which he had nailed shut. His brand-new glasses were heading for China!

The Great Depression was at its height and Grandpa had six children. He had spent \$20 for those glasses that very morning. He was really upset by the thought of having to buy another pair. "It's not fair," he told God as he went home in frustration. "I've been very faithful in giving of my time and money to your work, and now this".

Months later, the director of the orphanage was on furlough in the United States. He wanted to visit all the churches that supported him in China, so he came to speak one Sunday at my grandfather's small church in Chicago.

The missionary began by thanking the people for their faithfulness in supporting the orphanage. "But most of all," he said, "I must thank you for the glasses you sent last year. You see, the Communists had just swept through the orphanage, destroying everything, including my glasses. I was desperate. Even if I had the money, there was simply no way of replacing those glasses. Along with not being able to see well, I experienced headaches every day, so my co-workers and I were much in prayer about this. Then your crates arrived. When my staff removed the covers, they found a pair of glasses wedged between two blankets.

The missionary paused long enough to let his words sink in. Then, still gripped with the wonder of it all, he continued: "Folks, when I tried on the glasses, it was as though they had been custom made just for me! I want to thank you for being a part of that".

The people listened, happy for the miraculous glasses. But the missionary surely must have confused their church with another, they thought. There were no glasses on their list of items to be sent overseas. But sitting quietly in the back, with tears streaming down his face, an ordinary carpenter realised the Master Carpenter had used him in an extraordinary way.

In life when we make mistakes or something negative happens to us we can think that nothing good can come out of it. I want to encourage you today that everything happens for a reason. Why? I don't know, but a lot of negatives can sometimes be blessings in disguise. Let's try to look for the good in mistakes and negative circumstances and seek out what life is trying to teach us through it all. If the man in the story didn't lose his glasses, a miracle wouldn't have happened.

In closing the Bible says that "ALL things work together for good for those who love God and are called to his purpose".

Let's trust this week that all the things in our lives are working together for our good. God bless you.
