Dear Parents, Carers and Students

Welcome to this week's newsletter.

You will notice that I have already emailed you this week regarding our proposals to become a Church of England Academy. I know I have gone on about this a number of times already so please excuse me for just one last plug today.

The final formal consultation window of 4 weeks opened on Wednesday and will close on the last day of term. Hopefully by then we will have all the evidence we need to make the business case for our change to C of E status.

So far, we have collected a significant number of responses from staff and parents already after various events and the students view has been debated and voted on at student council. So, to everyone who has already emailed or filled in a response form or the online form – great thank you – It has been lovely to read so many positive and encouraging comments too!

If you haven't yet responded and you would like to, please email the office directly with your comments before the end of term. The documents emailed out on Wednesday clearly describe our rationale and clarify that this proposal is to secure what we do - our current ethos and values, reinforcing Open as a proudly inclusive school for its community, serving all faiths and none.

Outside the consultation, there is as always lots going on in the Academy. I know lots of students enjoyed the trip to the Natural History Museum in Cambridge last week to improve their observational drawing skills and others enjoyed an Aim Higher trip to UEA to see what Higher Education is all about. It was also great to welcome lots of people to the Work Experience event on Wednesday evening to hear about what is in store for the Year 10 and 12 students in the summer term.

From an internal quality perspective. I know I have mentioned our 'faculty review' process before, where leaders conduct a deep dive into the learning experience for students in one particular faculty per week — looking at; student work, lessons, student voice and the curriculum. These have now finished for the autumn term, and it is great to be able to reflect that we have seen so much excellent practice in the academy. Tweaks and improvements as always can be found, and we have shared them for action which we will follow up during the next round of faculty reviews in the spring term. We now switch our attention to 'year group review' to look at the Academy experience from a student point of view, particularly their pastoral support and their overall engagement with the Academy. As usual it is a mix of observation, student voice, and work checks. This is a new way to look at things and as we have completed the Year 11 review this week, we think it might be a good idea to add parent voice in to the mix. Too late for this week's review, but I hope that from the next one we will be asking parents of the year group to give their view on how we support them and their child in the Academy – probably through a feedback form through the newsletter – so watch this space – I think the next year review is the week after next and will focus on Year 10, so hopefully we will have a feedback form to make it easy to get involved.

I think that's plenty for now save for me to say a huge thank you to parents for your efforts getting students to school on time and in uniform – Almost everyone gets it right now in terms of uniform, and lateness is improving all the time. I know there are so many road works across town, planning to get across the city can feel like mounting an attempt at Mount Everest, but everything that you do to get the students here on time is most appreciated!


2. Art/Science Trip


