We then had a deeply encouraging talk from David Lloyd from Garden Church who reminded us that the Christmas story is about how we can all find the light at this time of year – and for Christians, that that light symbolises Jesus and reminds us that we are never alone. Themes which fit with our recent assemblies on courage and getting through difficult times.

I reflect, however, that we don't just talk about the good news at Christmas. As an Academy we very much put our values in to practice and, as every year, all around the Academy I can see lovely Christmas hampers forming – ready to be donated in our random acts of kindness at the end of term. I know some staff are volunteering to help with a variety of local campaigns and even our senior leadership Secret Santa this year has been used to buy presents not for each other, but for the Norwich Food Bank. Next week will see our slightly belated Christmas jumper day, for Save The Children, where we encourage students to 'Christmas up an old jumper", adding to the sense of joy during Christmas dinner day at the academy. This year we are also supporting the Year 11 prom with a non-uniform day on the last day of term too so yet another example of our community supporting a local cause!
