

# Open Academy Newsletter – 26 January 2024

Dear Parents, Carers and Students

Welcome to our newsletter this week.

I write today having been privileged to attend a most moving memorial service at St Peter Mancroft Church with 9 of our student leadership team. The service was the annual Holocaust memorial service – held as close as possible to the international Holocaust Memorial Day on the 27 January, which marks the day that Allied forces liberated the camp at Auschwitz concentration camp.

In acknowledging the industrial level murder of over 6 million people mainly Jews, alongside many Roma, Christian and other groups, Holocaust Memorial Day and this service are designed to ensure that we do not forget the atrocity and that we commit to work to make sure it never happens again.

Sadly, since the Holocaust there have been too many examples of genocide, for instance that visited on Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur and these too are memorialised at this service. As I discussed with our students representing a number of different faiths and none, there always must be mutual understanding and acknowledgement that it is essential to work towards this never happening again.

The student leaders were as always fantastic and presented a respectful and firm commitment of our young people to stand against oppression and violence.

Arriving at St Peter Mancroft Church in the city allowed us to reflect before the service on a very successful student council meeting this week. The Lord Mayor and Sheriff of Norwich attended the meeting in their chain of office and generously answered all the students very intriguing and perceptive questions. I have since received feedback from them to say how impressed they were with the student and inviting us for a tour of the guildhall – the historical home of the Sheriff of Norwich and a tour of the Council Chamber – with the possibility that we may be allowed to hold a full student council meeting in the chamber – an amazing opportunity which we are already working to organise.

Suggestion that I am so pleased about this because I get to sit in the big 'throne' as chairperson could not be further from the truth (well may be a little!), but I am hoping all the students will get the experience of a genuine moment of civic life. We are all very excited!

The council also heard excellent presentation from our sports leaders and charity leaders and our visitors commented upon how confidently and eloquently all of them presented. I am hoping there will be a full report in subsequent newsletters as communications leaders are identified.

For now, I will finish with the reflection that I could not be more proud of our student leaders and their quiet dignity today, and their enthusiastic leadership behaviour generally – we are really blessed.

We also offer homework Hubs on Monday and Tuesday from 3-4 pm for all year groups. This club provides support and devices so that students can access online platforms and complete any assigned work. 
