Dear Parents, Carers and Students

Welcome to this week's newsletter.

I mentioned last week a couple of very helpful websites which offer support for young people who are struggling. I thought that given how important and prevalent mental health issues are at this time, that it might be worth reminding you of these sites. I also thought I would share a little about how we go about supporting those in struggle in the academy.

First the reminder. The FYI website is a partnership between the Local authority and NHS. They have worked with children and young people to produce an excellent self-help one stop shop. The landing page https://www.fyinorfolk.nhs.uk/ has an excellent launch pad, if you scroll down that front page a tiny bit, you will see some simple face expressions to click on to match your concern and you can take it from there.

Students who are 11+ years old can access the Kooth service from home or school between 7.00am and 10.00pm – please have a look at https://www.kooth.com/. This service has been commissioned by the local healthcare trust to provide online chat, and support including video counselling for young people. You do have to create an account, but it is anonymous and offers contact and support from real clinicians – not just chatbots.

In the academy we invest heavily in pastoral support. We have year teams consisting of a teaching head of year, who also takes an overview of children's academic performance and how pastoral issues might affect that. We have assistant heads of year who are non-teaching, so they have more time to spend supporting students and following up on needs, brokering support and communicating with families.

Much of the time pastoral staff being available at non-teaching time is enough – students get help and support at break, lunch and before and after the school day. Some students however, who require a little more, may be offered further support.

Further support might look like regular weekly mentoring with a member of staff, a check in with the assistant head of year in the morning, during the day or we may issue a 'green card' which specifies support the student can access when they are struggling in lessons – it may just be for five minutes of regulation time – or access to the Open Ark and Mr Pimlott. Whatever will help get them through the day – every green card is different, but the purpose is the same – to help students access the support they need in school.

If students needs are beyond our experience or capacity we will signpost them to other services – we are fortunate to have great links to the Mental Health Support Team that is based in school. If there are concerns around aspects of crime and the law we have a safer school's officer in twice per week and we also use the services of counsellors, youth workers, social services and voluntary agencies as and when required.

In short, we are keen to do all we can to support our students and we encourage them and their parents/carers to discuss with us what they may be struggling with in whatever form that may need to be.





I will finish with a huge thank you to all the amazing staff who deliver these roles in the academy, from Mr Pimlott, our fab chaplain, Mr Davies and Mrs Thurtell, our awesome safeguarding team, the superb year teams, mentors and support workers and TAs, and not forgetting all the day to day support from the teachers either as form teacher or subject teacher. I hope you agree we are blessed to have such an amazing group of dedicated professionals!
