Principal's Introduction

Dear parents, carers and students.

Welcome to this week's newsletter.

You will have seen from the communication from the trust last week that I do not have that many more newsletters to write, given that I will be retiring shortly! I know some of you will already know that I started to reduce my hours last year in preparation for retirement, so it will not be that much of a surprise that my time is up.

I hope, therefore that you will forgive me this week for sharing some reflections on my career of 31 years and its relation to my time at Open.

Back in 1994 as I started in the classroom the internet was barely operational – the BBC launching its first website in 1994! I remember the internet became accessible through 'freeserve discs' via modems that made bizarre noises for 30 seconds before connecting. Desktop computers were just becoming accessible and for some reason almost all were named after various fruits – I know I had an Apricot XEN+ and school had an Apples, Acorns and Tangerines! I remember acquiring some older PCs from a local business and trying to persuade the governors to find the money to buy 6 copies of Microsoft Encarta – a digital encyclopaedia which had videos and animations of science topics (I am a science teacher by training) and dreamt one day of having a computer for every student in a class. Oh my word, how things have changed...

I am pretty sure I could have asked Chat GPT to write a reflection on a 31-year teaching career and it would make a far better job than this. Nowadays, instead of trying to put a computer on every desk, we are more concerned with limiting the use of the students' own mobile devices to prevent the myriad ways that the online world can distract, harm or affect them negatively. The computing world has become far more all-consuming than I would ever have thought as an new teacher and, as I retire, now an educational fossil, it is interesting to see that we are nowhere near knowing yet how to mine the online world for all the amazing good it can do, what it can share, teach and inspire whilst ensuring that our young people understand the risks and dangers that a largely unregulated 'wild west world' the internet can be.

What has become apparent more recently thanks to the pandemic, however, is that the basic functions of a school are way beyond just the acquisition of knowledge through the internet. Online learning was no match for bringing people together – children and adults learning how we get along, how we interact, how we create, communicate and relate with one another. Real people, in the real world, solving real problems.

Throughout my career, it has been these interactions, relationships and community that have inspired, encouraged and challenged me to keep going and whilst in the people business, we will never be perfect, I am blessed to say that I enjoy spending time in the Academy today more than ever before. With so many fantastic students, amazing teachers, support staff and brilliant leaders at Open coming together with a shared purpose. I am very hopeful for the future and I wish my successor, Mr Bagshaw and our whole community all the very best for the next phase of Open's journey. I will pause that reflection for this week – more will follow! So please do enjoy the rest of this week's newsletter.

Exam Hall Guidelines for Year 11 and Year 13 Students

We kindly ask all parents to remind their Year 11 and Year 13 children of the following rules for entering and being in the exam hall:

- Students must wear the full uniform upon entry to the exam hall. Students are not permitted to wear coats in the exam hall.
- Any badges on jumpers or blazers must be removed.
- Phones, headphones, or watches should not be on or in pockets.
- Water bottles must be standard mineral water bottles (for example, those available from the canteen) with no labels on them.
- Unless they have a toilet pass, students are not allowed to leave the exam hall for a toilet break.
- Students should arrive on time; the latest arrival time for morning exams is 8.50am and for afternoon exams, it is 12.55pm. If students are unable to attend an exam, please let us know as soon as possible, but unless it's a serious medical situation, we strongly advise all students to attend.
