

Open Academy Update 9 October 2020 For parents and students – please do discuss the contents with your child!

Just as we start to think we are returning to something close to normality, the new reality appears. This week in the form of our Open Evening. Usually we would be delighted to welcome the potential new Year 7s into the Academy for tours, talks and tasters in an evening where we get to share the Academy at it's best. For safety reasons this year in terms of COVID-19 infection control we made the painful decision to move the whole event online.

Given how busy we are, running the catch-up Hubs for over 150 students every night, finding time to learn how to pull together a virtual event proved challenging. However, we did manage to produce a very honest authentic Open presentation experience – just online. Please do encourage parents or carers of potential new students to have a look if they haven't already and we are keen to hear if anyone has any further questions.

Our attendance is still close to 96% overall which is fantastic, so well done and thank you, but equally well done and thank you to those who have made the difficult decision not to send children in when they display one of the core symptoms until a test has been sought and result confirmed. So far these have all been negative, but that just highlights how important it is to continue all our efforts to keep people safe

We have seen an improvement in students sitting in smaller groups at break and lunch, which allows effective track and trace if required and virtually everyone is remembering to hand sanitise and to social distance from staff. This week I have reminded students that staff also means the dinner ladies – so I have asked students not to handle food unless they are buying it and to not lean over the counter, but to give the canteen staff the same space as other adults in the Academy.

We continue to work to keep everyone as safe as possible, but also to plan for when things become more challenging. To that end it is key that your child attempts all homework set. We are deliberately setting homework on Teams to ensure that students continue to develop their confidence using it. This will ensure that if/as/when we need to respond to the virus, the technical side of carrying on with schooling at home will be fully in place for all. It is also vital that students complete every homework set as this is the main thing teachers will be marking (not being able to collect in books). So without completing homework, students will miss out on key assessment information

Finally just a quick mention that it is World Mental Health day tomorrow with a theme of 'good mental health for all'. Undoubtedly, some are finding being back in the Academy really tough and as the half term continues I thought it might be useful to highlight this and offer a link to the young minds website – I have picked the parent support page but there are lots of helpful resources and information on here for all <u>https://youngminds.org.uk/find-help/for-parents/</u>

- We are aware that a number of students are having difficulties accessing homework. We are planning to run an after school learning Hub to support students, more information will follow once the plans have been finalised.
- There have been some issues over students bringing expensive fidget toys into school. Students should not bring valuable items into school. If a student requires a fidget aid we are able to supply blu tac.
- Behaviour at social time continues to cause concern with students continuing to playfight and be on their mobile phones. From Monday the Year 7s will have access to board games to use at break and lunchtime. We are also looking into the possibility of other activities, dodgeball was on today at lunchtime and if successful will be on every Friday week A.
- From Monday, any mobile phones being used inappropriately in lessons, will be removed, put into a plastic wallet and locked into the safe for parents to come and collect.
- At lesson change over students should be able to get to their next lessons within 3 minutes, if students arrive to lessons late then the register may be marked late.



Every morning a uniform check is carried out. Can we please remind parents/carers about uniform:

- Girls can wear plain black trousers or skirts which **MUST** be knee-length.
- Plain black, flat shoes which can be polished no trainers, logos, high heels, boots or backless shoes.
- Shirts must be tucked in.
- Ties done up correctly with the top button of a shirt done up.

Any student coming into the academy in inappropriate uniform may be provided with an appropriate item to wear in the academy for that day.

Duke of Edinburgh's Award

Following an assembly with Years 9 and 10, students have been offered the opportunity to enrol in the Bronze Award. A form has been emailed to students. Enrolment is £22 (we can apply to the DofE for free places for students who have free school meals). Other costs involved are the expeditions which will take place between April and July. At the moment we are not sure if we will be able to camp overnight, but we can still do most aspects of the expedition safely. The maximum cost of the expeditions is £25 x 2 expeditions. If we can't camp this could be reduced.

Following an assembly with Year 12 and 13 students have been offered the opportunity to enrol in the Silver Award. A form will be emailed on request or a paper copy given. Enrolment is £22 (we can apply to the DofE for free places for students who have free school meals) Other costs involved are the expeditions which will take place between April and July, at the moment we are not sure if we will be able to camp overnight but we can still do most aspects of the expedition safely. The maximum cost of the expeditions are £45 x 2 expeditions. If we can't camp this could be reduced. (The cost is higher for silver because we need to travel further and it is 3 days rather than 2).


6. Sixth Form News


Care packages for the homeless What we need: • Toothbrushes & tooth paste • Hand sanitiser • Long lasting food

7. Careers

Our 'Sector of the Month' for October is Digital Creative and ICT. This is a vital and innovative sector in the Eastern region with a current workforce of 24,000 and plans to create another 10,000 tech roles by 2024 so potentially very appealing to our students. Open Academy is lucky to have Enterprise Adviser, Ben de Tarrier from Aviva working with us and this week he has called on a member of the 'Learning and Knowledge' team at the company to write a blog about digital roles at the company. 8. Next steps after GCSEs

If your child is in Year 11, you and they might be considering next steps after GCSEs. There are different qualifications your child might be interested in, here are just some below:

A levels – Your child will usually choose 3 subjects (or might also take a mixture of A levels and BTECs). There is a huge range of subjects to choose from, including subjects like Psychology and Law, which are not usually offered at GCSE. They are usually assessed in a similar way to GCSEs.

BTECs – Your child can either choose an Extended BTEC, which is the equivalent to 3 A levels, or a BTEC which is equivalent to 1 A level. Again, there is a huge range to choose from, including subjects like Health and Social Care, Sport and Construction. The course is split into units, and students are assessed in different ways within the units – it might be through an assignment, practical activity or exam.

T Levels – T levels are new qualifications which offer a mix of classroom learning and an industry placement for at least 315 hours (approximately 45 days). The areas you can study T levels in are increasing each year, and currently includes Digital Production and Education and Childcare. Again, these are equivalent to 3 A levels.

Apprenticeships – These are available at different levels. We will discuss apprenticeships in more detail in the next couple of weeks. An apprenticeship is where your child is employed by a company. They work for 80% of their time, and receive training 20% of the time.

To find out more about these and other qualifications, a great place to start is <u>www.helpyouchoose.org</u>. On this website there is information about qualifications and a list of sixth form and college providers in Norfolk, so you and your child can find out exactly what is available. If your child knows what they would like to do after sixth form or college, it is worth checking which type of qualification and subject would help them with this. For example, if they would like to go to university, every university website has a list of entry requirements. These will list any subjects your young person needs to study at sixth form or college.




9. Library News & Updates

This week I want to share the following story with you. Its author is unknown. One day, a professor entered his classroom and asked his students to prepare for a surprise test. They all waited anxiously at their desks for the exam to begin. The professor handed out the exams with the text facing down, as usual. Once he handed them all out, he asked the students to turn over the papers.



To everyone's surprise, there were no questions, just a black dot in the centre of the paper. The professor, seeing the expression on everyone's faces, told them the following:

"I want you to write about what you see there."

The students, confused, got started on the inexplicable task. At the end of the class, the professor took all the exams, and started reading each one of them out loud in front of all the students. All of them, with no exception, defined the black dot, trying to explain its position in the centre of the sheet. After all had been read, the classroom silent, the professor started to explain:

"I'm not going to grade you on this, I just wanted to give you something to think about. No one wrote about the white part of the paper. Everyone focused on the black dot."
